



## Louisiana Migrant Education Program ID&R Team



### Eligibility Scenarios

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#### Scenario 1

Francisco and Juana moved from Dallas, Texas to Hammond, LA with their 3 school aged children on January 25<sup>th</sup>, 2020. Their family has moved from Texas to Hammond every year for the past 8 years so Francisco and Juana can work laying plastic for the strawberry fields. This year when the family arrived, Francisco and Juana discovered that there was no work available for them since the weather affected most of the strawberry crop. The couple find a job at a local restaurant in Hammond instead.

The Louisiana MEP recruiter visits the family on January 27<sup>th</sup>, 2020. Do the children qualify for the LMEP? If so, what would their COE look like?

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#### Scenario 2

Marcos left behind his family to find any type of work on 6/12/19 from Houma to Belle Chasse and ended up picking green peppers two weeks after arriving. After the green pepper season was finished, he found more consistent work in New Orleans waiting tables. So, on 8/15/19, he moved from Plaquemines Parish to New Orleans. His children, Darren and Daniela (ages 8 and 9), moved to join him in New Orleans on 11/15/19 after Marcos was able to get an apartment that could hold them all.

The Louisiana MEP Recruiter visits the family on November 20<sup>th</sup>, 2019. Do the children qualify for the MEP? If so, what would the COE look like?

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#### Scenario 3

Every year, Mr. Marcos Perez left his family in Tamaulipas, Mexico and moved to Rayne, LA on January 8<sup>th</sup>, 2017 to harvest rice and crawfish for 8 months at a time. On August 1<sup>st</sup>, 2017, Marcos moved back to Tamaulipas to care for his mother who was ill. On August 30, 2018, Marcos, his wife and Marcos Jr., 8 years old, moved to Tangipahoa Parish to work in a restaurant.

The Louisiana MEP Recruiter visits the family on September 7<sup>th</sup>, 2018. Do the children qualify for the MEP? If so, what would the COE look like?

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### Scenario 4

Charles and his three children ages 10, 12 and 15 live in Houma. Every brown shrimp season, Charles and his oldest son, David, take several trips on their boat from Houma to the waters of Grand Isle so they can harvest brown shrimp. This year, they made at least 7 trips of 4 days each with their first trip starting on June 2<sup>nd</sup>, 2019 and their last trip ending on August 6<sup>th</sup>, 2019.

The Louisiana MEP Recruiter visits the family on October 5<sup>th</sup>, 2019. Are the children eligible for the MEP? If so, what would the COE look like?

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### Scenario 5

Ma Lay moved from Thailand to Jackson, MS on June 10<sup>th</sup>, 2017, and, a week after the move, she began a temporary job packing beef at Perry Processing for 8 months. After getting enough money to afford to pay for her daughter's travel, Ma Lay's daughter moved to join her on July 1<sup>st</sup>, 2018.

The Mississippi MEP recruiter visits the family on January 27<sup>th</sup>, 2019. Do the children qualify for the MEP? If so, what would their COE look like?

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### Scenario 5 continued

Ma Lay and her child moved again from Jackson, MS to Farmerville, LA on June 1<sup>st</sup>, 2019. Ma Lay actively sought work at two different meat processing plants by filling out applications, but found that no work was available. On August 25<sup>th</sup>, 2019, Ma Lay and her son moved to a different residence in Farmerville, and Ma Lay began a new temporary job cutting chicken beaks at Foster Farms.

The Louisiana MEP recruiter visits the family on January 4<sup>th</sup>, 2020. Do the children qualify for the LMEP? If so, what would their COE look like?

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
